
A 2023 Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) evaluated the condition of KPFD's fire stations and found improvements needed for safety, efficiency, and long-term planning. The study looked at the age and condition of facilities, compliance with fire codes, and firefighter health and safety. A key focus was Station #46 in Key Center, which serves as KPFD headquarters, but all stations were assessed for upgrades to ensure KPFD can continue serving the community effectively. Section 3. Status of Key Center Properties and Station #46

For more than 30 years, KPFD planning reports have emphasized the need to keep a Fire District presence in Key Center. Recognizing that replacing Station #46 would take years, the Board of Fire Commissioners began searching for a suitable site in 2018. By 2021, the District purchased three parcels of land in Key Center for potential future use.

However, with changing priorities and mixed community opinions, the Board voted on January 28, 2025 to sell the Calahan property (Parcel C). While the other two properties (Parcels A & B), remain as a possible location for a future Station #46, we are gathering community input on whether to keep or sell these properties and how to plan for future Fire District facilities.

Section 4. Fire District Funding Sources

KPFD is mainly funded through two local property tax levies: the Regular Fire Levy (\$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value) and the EMS Levy (\$0.50 per \$1,000). As property values rise, these tax rates decrease unless voters approve a "Levy Lid Lift" to restore them to their original levels. Larger projects, like new fire stations, are typically funded through voter-approved Capital Bond Measures, which spread costs over 10-20 years. KPFD doesn't get county or state property tax funding, so we depend on voter-approved measures to help us keep up with inflation, maintain service levels, upgrade equipment, and when possible, increase staffing.
